# Abstract

Doris Fischer, *People of Faith*, PF-A-L-2016-014

**Biographical Information Overview of Interview:** Doris Schuessler (Fischer) was born in June, 1922 in the small town of Bluffs, Illinois, and grew up there during the Great Depression. Her family attended Bluff Lutheran Church, and she attended public schools there, graduating from high school in 1940. She moved to Springfield, Illinois during the war, and in 1946 she married Harold Fischer, a soldier with whom she had corresponded during the war. The couple remained in Springfield, and Doris worked for the Illinois State Police for over thirty years, then volunteered for the State Police for many years after that. Shortly after their marriage, the Fischers joined Faith Lutheran Church, which was founded in 1946 by the Augustana Synod of the Lutheran Church.

The main focus of this interview is on Faith Lutheran Church, and its history from its founding in 1946 to 2015, when it consolidated with Atonement Lutheran Church and Luther Memorial, also Springfield based Evangelical Lutheran Church in America congregations, to form a new congregation, Peace Evangelical Lutheran Church. Doris and Harold were active members of Faith for most of the congregation's history. Doris speaks extensively about Pastor Wellington P. Witkop, who served as the minister for Faith from 1956 to 1989, and Pastor Glen VanderKloot, who served as minister from 1989 until 2015. Doris discussed the various construction phases the growing church experienced in the 1950s through the 1970s, and the gradual decline in membership in the 1990s and 2000s. She also traced the evolution of Lutheranism in America, from the Augustana Synod to the Lutheran Church in America and in 1988 to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
