Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Gary J. Price was born on October 7, 1948 in Fresno, California, and spent his early years in Kermin, California. He entered the Marine Corps in May, 1971 with the goal of becoming a pilot, despite not having a college degree. By the following year he had been commissioned, and was progressing through flight training, while also getting married in November, 1972.

By 1974 Lieutenant Price was stationed in Okinawa, assigned to HMM 165, (a Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron) equipped with CH-46 helicopters. In late April, the unit shipped out with the Navy heading toward the Philippines and South Vietnam. For the next several weeks, Price and his unit supported the evacuation of US personnel from South Vietnam, while stationed on board the USS Dubuque LPD-8, an amphibious transport vessel. In the years following that experience, Price progressed through a series of assignments and schools, experiencing the lean years in the late 1970s and the Reagan years when the military went through a resurgence. In the mid-1980s he was stationed at Yuma, Arizona, assigned to the Marine Aviation Weapons and Tactics Squadron (MAWTS-1), where he was involved with developing Marine aviation tactics. In 1989 Lieutenant Colonel Price took command of HMM-161. One year later he was leading his unit to Saudi Arabia, following Saddam Hussein's invasion of Kuwait in August, 1990. Price talks at length about the unit's involvement during Desert Shield (the defense of Saudi Arabia) and Desert Storm in early 1991, the liberation of Kuwait and defeat of Iraqi forces.

Subsequent assignments included more schooling, command of the Headquarters and Service Battalion at Quantico, Virginia, and his final assignment commanding a Naval ROTC unit at the Virginia Military Institute in Lexington, Virginia. He retired from the Marine Corps on September 1, 2001.
